FIRST 17 "EUROPEAN UNIVERSITIES" SELECTED: A MAJOR STEP TOWARDS BUILDING A EUROPEAN EDUCATION AREA



The European Commission has today announced the higher education institutions from all over Europe that will be part of the first "European Universities" alliances. They will enhance the quality and attractiveness of European higher education and boost cooperation between institutions, their students and staff.

Out of 54 applications received, 17 European Universities involving 114 higher education institutions from 24 Member States were selected (see Annex), based on an evaluation carried out by 26 independent external experts, including rectors, professors and researchers, appointed by the Commission. European Universities are transnational alliances of higher education institutions from across the EU that share a long-term strategy and promote European values and identity.

The initiative is designed to significantly strengthen mobility of students and staff, and foster the quality, inclusiveness and competitiveness of European higher education.

The selection of European Universities includes a broad range of higher education institutions from across the EU, from universities of applied sciences, technical universities and universities of fine arts to comprehensive and research-intensive universities.

HOW CAN SCHOOLS SUPPORT THE DEVELOPMENT OF OUR DEMOCRACIES?



The last article issued by Eurydice tells us about the importance of democratic, respectful and committed dialogue, which, although not usual, is a key element in education for citizenship, specially if it is supported by schools.

In many countries, political debate is becoming ever more polarised. Fuelled by amoral media seeking out scandal and dispute, contemporary politics thrives on controversy and opposing views.

However, schools are generally not the most democratic of institutions. Children tend to learn that others decide what they will be doing during the day. Most children would probably not vote for the particular blend of subjects that they are taught in national curricula, nor the doses of learning that they receive. Research confirms, however, that practices such as classroom discussion and learning by doing activities foster critical thinking, help students understand others and develop open-minded social attitudes. Education can support students by nurturing mutual respect and integrating a sense of democracy into the everyday school experience. Education should support pupils' feeling of having a voice, of being heard, and of being capable of contributing to decision-making in the school.

In this context, citizenship education provides the formal knowledge of a country's constitutional structure, political institutions and competences such as social responsibility.

ROCK: USAR LA CULTURA PARA DAR UN NUEVO SOPLO DE VIDA A LOS CASCOS HISTÓRICOS DE LAS CIUDADES

Y es que según los investigadores que trabajan en el proyecto ROCK, financiado con fondos europeos, el cambio puede hacerse aprovechando el patrimonio cultural de las ciudades. Según afirman en el sitio web del proyecto, el arte, los monumentos, los yacimientos arqueológicos, la historia oral y las tradiciones «pueden ser un motor único y potente para la regeneración, el desarrollo sostenible y el crecimiento económico de toda la ciudad».

El objetivo del proyecto ROCK es ayudar a que los cascos históricos afectados evolucionen hacia «distritos sostenibles y creativos». Estas iniciativas se están implementando en siete ciudades modelo: Atenas, Cluj-Napoca, Eindhoven, Liverpool, Lyon, Turín y Vilna. También se han elegido tres ciudades como ejemplo, Bolonia, Lisboa y Skopie, para estudiar la efectividad de este enfoque y la posibilidad de reproducirlo.

EDUCATION AND CLIMATE CHANGE



Climate change is a topic unlike any other. While the prospect of human-induced global destruction may sometimes seem too overwhelming to address, everyone has a part to play in halting it. This is the message of a major social movement of schoolchildren that has risen up in response to the inadequate actions of our politicians. But if we all need to act differently, what does this imply for the way in which we educate our children?

According to Unesco, "education is critical in helping populations understand and address the impacts of climate change, and in encouraging the changes in attitudes and behaviour needed to help them address the causes of climate change, adopt more sustainable lifestyles and develop skills that support different modules of economies, as well as to adapt to the impact of climate change". Unesco promotes climate change education (ECC) as part of its Global Action Programme on Education for Sustainable Development (ESD). Education for sustainable development is a component of the fourth sustainable development goal on education. Goal number 13 on climate action targets the improvement of education on climate change. Indeed, education is about teaching young generations to understand and reflect on the physical and social world surrounding us so that they become citizens able to think critically, participate in decision-making and take action. Climate change education is therefore also citizenship education.

2019 U-MULTIRANK UNIVERSITY RANKING: EUROPEAN UNIVERSITIES PERFORMING WELL



The sixth and largest-ever edition of the U-Multirank university ranking, scoring more than 1,700 universities from 96 countries, has just been published.

Every year, U-Multirank compares higher education institutions' performance in areas that matter most to students. A mapshowing the universities with top overall performance is a new feature U-Multirank has added in this year's edition.

European higher education institutions are doing very well: EDHEC Business School (France), Chalmers University of Technology (Sweden), and the University of Groningen (the Netherlands) are among the top performers. U-Multirank has also analysed the international openness of universities worldwide. Results show that the more universities cooperate internationally, the more satisfied their students are with their learning experience. These universities also do better in knowledge transfer and research impact.

Initiated by the European Commission and co-funded by the Erasmus+ Programme, U-Multirank is the first global multi-dimensional ranking allowing users to create their own personalised rankings by selecting performance indicators on teaching and learning, international orientation, knowledge transfer, regional engagement and research. Following the call of EU leaders at the 2017 Gothenburg Summit, the Commission launched a €60 million call to develop the European Universities initiative, which aims to support the establishment of highly competitive, inclusive transnational universities. The results of the call are set to be published in the coming weeks.

PREVIOUS AWARDED WINERS



The European Commission and Europa Nostra, the leading European heritage network, have announced the winners of this year's European Heritage Awards/Europa Nostra Awards, funded by the EU's Creative Europe programme. The 25 laureates from 16 countries have been recognised for their accomplishments in conservation, research, dedicated service, and education, training and awareness-raising.

The EU Prize for Cultural Heritage / Europa Nostra Awards (as of 2019 the European Heritage Awards / Europa Nostra Awards) was launched in 2002 by the European Commission and has been organised by Europa Nostra ever since. The Awards promote best practices related to heritage conservation, management, research, education and communication. In this way, the Awards scheme contributes to a stronger public recognition of cultural heritage as a strategic resource for Europe's society and economy.

The Awards honour every year up to 30 outstanding heritage achievements from all parts of Europe. Up to seven are selected as Grand Prix laureates and one receives the Public Choice Award, chosen in an online poll. All the winners receive a certificate as well as a plaque. The Grand Prix laureates also receive €10,000 each.

ENTORNOS DE APRENDIZAJE DIGITAL: ¿LA MEJOR MANERA DE AVANZAR?



In the last few years, people's use of various digital technology, be it computers, smart phones and even virtual reality has increased significantly both at home and in the work place.

Using digital learning environments in teaching may therefore seem a logical step in the evolution of education systems, since computers, smartphones and other appliances are so widely used in society, especially by young people. But what does this imply for more traditional learning and teaching methods? Will pen and paper become as obsolete as rubbing two sticks together to make fire?

The discussion of incorporating more technology-based learning environments into teaching is a hot topic. The European Commission, for example, has anAction Plan with 11 actions to support technology-use and digital competence development in education. For schools, these include improving internet connectivity and increasing awareness on cyber security, as well as addressing the gender gap in digital and entrepreneurial skills.

It is inevitable that learning in digital environments will increase in the future, and the hope is that this should ensure that pupils will also become more digitally competent. This is no doubt the thinking behind reforms in education systems such as Finland that seek to replace a focus on learning to write by developing children's keyboard skills.

Rightly or wrongly, when Finland introduces a reform to its education system, other countries often follow. However, in this case learning "analogically" with pen and paper has benefits that we may not want to abandon. Research shows that our brains seem to be wired to retain information more easily if we write things down, because we need to process the information while writing with a pen. This seems to help learning and retention of information, while typing notes on a computer is a more "brainless" activity. Moreover, a meta-study has shown that reading on paper rather than on screen improves students' text comprehension.

What matters is the quality of learning rather than the methods we develop for teaching. Pen and paper may remain at least as mighty as the keyboard or touch-screen for some time to come – at least as far as effective learning is concerned.

The Prize is awarded annually to new and emerging authors, recognising literary talent from all corners of Europe. It highlights the wealth of contemporary European literature as well as Europe's rich cultural and linguistic heritage.

The EUPL is an award which recognises outstanding new and emerging literary talents across Europe, and highlights the wealth of contemporary European literature. The prize also draws attention to the continent's unique cultural and linguistic heritage. So far, the EUPL has awarded 108 authors from 41 countries and this year, it is announcing its first ever winners from Georgia and Ukraine.

Supported by Creative Europe, the initiative is accessible to all countries participating in this EU funding programme for the cultural and creative sectors for the current period 2014-2020.

The winners will receive their awards at a ceremony hosted by Commissioner Navracsics in Brussels on 2 October. Each winner will also receive a prize of €5,000.

On 18 June, the European Commission celebrates the 30th anniversary of the Jean Monnet Activities – which promote and finance educational programmes on European integration – with a one-day conference under the title "30 years of Jean Monnet Activities: Why study the European Union today?" in Brussels.

Tibor Navracsics,Commissioner for Education, Culture, Youth and Sport, will open the event with a keynote speech. The programme continues with series of panel discussions, focusing on the new challenges of the technological advances in the digital age (such as information overload, fake news, online violence) and the solutions for these issues in the area of education.

The European Commission celebrates the 30th anniversary of the Jean Monnet Activities through a series of events and other initiatives around the world. Over the last 30 years, almost 5000 projects have contributed to the field of European integration studies. Currently 500 000 students benefit from the Jean Monnet Actions every year, which is now present in 87 countries worldwide. The 30th anniversary of the Jean Monnet Actions in 2019 provides an opportunity to discuss its impact on European studies worldwide but also its wider impact on our society.

ERASMUS+ ENRICHING OUR CULTURAL HERITAGE

ERASMUS+: A TURNING POINT IN THE LIVES OF 5 MILLION EUROPEAN STUDENTS



New evidence shows that Erasmus+ makes students more successful in their personal and professional lives and helps universities to become more innovative, according to two new independent studies released by the European Commission.

The large-scale studies based on the feedback from nearly 77 000 students and staff and over 500 organisations measure and analyse the impact the Erasmus+ programme has on its main beneficiaries. Results show how the EU programme helps prepare young Europeans for the new digital era and thrive in their future careers. Erasmus+ also boosts innovation capacity of universities, their international engagement and ability to answer the needs of the labour market.

The two studies (Erasmus+ Higher Education Impact study and the Erasmus+ Higher Education Strategic Partnerships and Knowledge Alliances study) assessed the impact of the programme on its two main beneficiaries: individuals and organisations.
